

But now a new Pharaoh ruled – one who did not remember Joseph. He hated God's people. He beat them and made them his slaves.


However, God blessed His people and gave them many children.

One Hebrew mother hid her baby boy. She and her husband trusted God to look after him.




Before long the baby was too big and noisy to hide. So his mother made a basket, put him in it, and placed it among the tall grass on the river bank.

The princess felt sorry for him and said, 'This must be one of the Hebrew children.'






Miriam came and asked the princess, 'Would you like a Hebrew lady to take care of him?'





and bring My people out of Egypt.'


'I am not great,' said Moses. 'How can I go to Pharaoh?'


God said, 'I will be with you. You will bring My people to this mountain to worship Me.'


Moses asked, 'Who will I say sent me?'

let you go.'










Moses went back to his people and said, 'God has heard you and is going to save you.'



Moses said to Pharaoh, 'The Lord wants you to let His people go out into the desert to worship Him.'


'Who is the Lord,' Pharaoh asked, 'and why should I obey Him?'


Pharaoh was angry and ordered God's people to do more work.

He is on his way to the river.'







A week later God sent frogs – so many that they were everywhere.

Then Pharaoh changed his mind and said, 'You can't go!'






So God sent other plagues – this time, only on the Egyptians. God wanted Pharaoh to see that He loved His people.





The plagues God sent on Egypt ruined the country, but they did not change Pharaoh's heart. He would not let God's people go out into the desert to worship the Lord.







I am the Lord.


'But I will see the blood on the sides and top of your door. I will pass over you and will not hurt you.'


They believed God.

on the sides and top of their doors.




They roasted the meat and ate it, packed their bags and waited inside their houses.




When God's people saw the soldiers coming, they were afraid and cried out to the Lord.

'Don't be afraid,' said Moses. 'Stand still and see what God will do. He will fight for you and you will never see these Egyptians again.'







On the way, God brought them to a place where there was no food. They grumbled to Moses.



That evening quails were everywhere. The people caught them and prepared them for dinner.







On the sixth day they picked up enough manna for two days. But some did not listen to what God said. They went out on the seventh day to get some. There was nothing.


The Lord was cross and said, 'How long will you go on disobeying My words?'

and you will be a priest nation for Me.'




Moses came down from the mountain and told the people what God said.

The people replied, 'We will do all that God says.'




Then God wanted to speak to His people.

Do not steal.


Do not tell lies about anyone.






Moses was on Mt Sinai receiving the Ten Commandments. He was hidden by God's cloud.


Forty days went by and Moses hadn't come back.


The people said to Aaron, 'Moses brought us out of Egypt, but we don't know where he is. You make us a god to take us to our new land.'














Moses was angry.

Then he destroyed the golden calf.


Moses said to Aaron, 'Why did you lead these people into this great sin?'

to make a god for them.'




Moses called out, 'Those who are on the Lord's side come to me.'

God heard Moses' prayer and promised that He would be with Moses and His people.




Moses asked the Lord, 'Please show me Your glory.'

While Moses was on Mt Sinai God showed him what the glorious worship in heaven was like.


It was the heavenly temple.





Moses came down from the mountain and said to the people, 'God wants you to bring an offering to Him. He wants you to make a tent, a place where we can worship Him and where He will reign as king.

'Bring gold, silver, bronze, blue, purple and red material, goat's hair, leather, wood, oil and spices, sweet smelling incense and precious stones.





'Come and make the place for worship, just as God has shown us: curtains with pictures of cherubims on them, a cover for the tent, a covenant box, its poles, and mercy seat, a table, a lampstand, an altar of incense, an altar for burnt offerings, a wash basin and special garments for the priests to wear before God in the Holy Place.'

The people had seen that God had forgiven them. Their hearts were full of thankfulness and they brought what was needed for God's tent.

Soon Moses had to say, 'Stop. We have too much.'

Many people helped to make the things for the tent.







Then they set it up.
Two rooms were in the tent;
one for the Holy Place
and the other for the Most Holy Place.
Between these two rooms
they hung the curtain, called the 'veil'.

In the first room they put the table, the lampstand and the small altar of incense.

In the other room behind the veil they placed the covenant box.

Around the two rooms they hung curtains to form a courtyard. This is where they put the altar.






The tabernacle was finished.

Moses anointed everything with oil, and made it holy for God.

He washed the priests' hands and feet, put special clothes on them and anointed them.



God is building a home for Himself right now. It is we, ourselves, who trust in His Son Jesus. We are the home God will live in forever.

This sacrifice was made every morning and evening.





The Day of Atonement was a special day, held once a year. It was the only day the high priest could go behind the curtain into the Most Holy Place. No one else could go in.

Before the high priest could go there, he needed to be cleansed from his sin. He would offer a bull and a ram.



Then the people would bring him two goats which he would bring to God. He would choose one of them and offer it as a sin offering for all the people.







He would take with him some blood, coals from the altar and two handfuls of incense. The smoke of the incense from the fire would cover the covenant box. He would sprinkle the blood on the covenant box as an offering for his sin.

Then he would take some blood from the goat into the Most Holy Place, as an offering for the sins of the people.



After this was finished he would come out and take the second goat, put his hands on it and confess the sins of the people. He would give the goat to a man to take to the wilderness to let go free.




When they returned they said, 'The land is good.

Let us go back to Egypt.'







God said to Moses, 'These people have seen My miracles. When will they believe Me? I am going to destroy them and make a great nation from you.'


Moses said, 'Don't do that.

God was leading His people through the wilderness and they came to the edge of Edom.




'No,' said the king.

and we don't like the manna any more.'




The Lord sent poisonous snakes into the camp.

Moses did as God said. He made a bronze snake and put it on a pole.


'Look!' he said.





Come and curse them, so I can get rid of them.'






On the way




God opened Balaam's eyes and he saw the angel of the Lord with a sword in his hand. Balaam was ashamed and fell down on his face.

The angel said, 'Your donkey has saved your life. When you go to the king, you are to only speak the words I tell you.'




King Balak of Moab built altars and got everything ready for Balaam to curse God's people.




After leaving Egypt,

across the river.


God said to Moses,
